

Our Staff



Our school staff play an essential role in ensuring our school is a safe, happy and effective place for our children to learn.

Some of our teachers have been at John Scurr for many years and hold management responsibilities. Each year group is taught by a team of teachers, assistants, and special needs teachers that work with particular children.

We also work closely with many outside agencies where necessary to support the development of our children. The school is supported by a team of experienced office staff and excellent premises management.

School Building



The school is housed in a 1920's three-storey building that has three halls separated from the classrooms by corridors.

The accommodation provides for a nursery, and two classrooms per year group. We also have excellent facilities for 2 year olds.

Most classrooms are large and light with group-teaching rooms on all floors, we are well resourced and have a developing library. There is a multi-use games area.

The school has an edible garden, a Forest School area with mud kitchen, a High Needs base, excellent play structures and a popular tree house.

The School Day



The school will allow one parent or carer to drop off and collect.

Attendance



It is very important that children attend school regularly. Missed school sessions can seriously hinder your child's education. If your child is unwell, or to be absent from school for any reason, a parent must phone the school office as early as possible stating the reason.

All absences taken as holiday, or without consent will be noted as unauthorised, and a monetary fine will be enforced. This absence will also count against your child attendance record.


Application for "holiday" leave of absence will be refused. We ask you to seriously reconsider taking holidays during term time.

Great emphasis is put on regular attendance and close monitoring takes place on a regular basis. In order to reward and encourage high level of attendance, and emphasis' the importance of education, the school has agreed the following:

Parent / Carers



We believe that parents and carers are the first educators of their children and therefore we encourage a close partnership between parents and school from the outset. Before your child starts at John Scurr, you will be given information about the school and the opportunity to visit with your child.

Parents will receive newsletters from the Headteacher advising them of forthcoming events. This information will also be published on our website along with detailed information about our school community.

When we are able to – we organize 'stay and play' and 'stay and learn' sessions for our youngest children and their parents.



Communicating With You



Communicating with home and school is paramount to ensuring excellent outcomes. We promote both informal and formal communication to ensure a bespoke approach.

At John Scurr Primary we offer:

- Termly parents learning conferences.
- A mid-year written report (KS1/2) to ensure we are focused in the end of year goals for your child.
- Personalised end of key stage (Rec, Yr2 and Yr6) written results against National Expectations.
- End of the day informal discussions with a class teacher as we say goodbye.
- A Family Support Worker available for conversations to answer queries and concerns.
- A texting and email service to remind you about important events.
- Regular newsletters, website updates and workshops.
- Regular meetings with our Inclusion Leader, School Nurse or Phase Leaders to help support individual needs.
- A yearly questionnaire and Parents Forums.
- A regularly updated website.

The Curriculum



Learning is central to what we do at John Scurr and throughout the school children are actively encouraged to develop and challenge themselves as learners.

Our curriculum is designed to help children learn the essential knowledge, skills and understanding of a broad range of curriculum subjects. We encourage them to engage with their learning so that they remain committed to learning throughout their school careers and their lives. We help develop the personal qualities they need to be good citizens; and believe the curriculum we provide is broad, engaging and captures the interest of the children.

We teach the Early Years Foundation Stage Curriculum and the National Curriculum and at John Scurr our own curriculum extends far beyond this.

Our Governors are representatives of businesses and services community, parents and staff members.

They all bring a range of interests, knowledge and skills and have responsibility for overseeing the organisation, curriculum and budget of the school. Governors meet each term, as a body and in smaller sub-committees and provide support and challenge the leadership of the school.



John Scurr School Council/Pupil Voice meets regularly and is elected from Years 1 to 6 by their classmates, and comprises two children from each class. The children vote for people who will be responsible, hardworking and caring.

The councillors have a range of important jobs to do for the school, and all children take their role very seriously. Most recently our school council have been part of the recruitment interview process for new applicants to the school and leading a climate change rally.



Enrichment



We are proud of the many ways that we enrich the curriculum at John Scurr.

We believe strongly in the power of the arts to help children express themselves as well as to support the achievement of high standards.

Our curriculum map for each year group is led by the Unity curriculum which drives the knowledge, vocabulary skill progression for your child.

We have an ongoing partnership, and are a platinum 'Sing up School'. The curriculum is further organised into some topics lasting for a term or half a term, with Science, Computing, History, Geography, Design Technology, PE, RE and PSHE are covered in this way. Curriculum lessons are lively, engaging and the children will be involved in independent research, presenting, drama and designing.

We also recognise that not all children learn in the same way and we structure our lessons to meet these different needs. We are constantly updating and defining the curriculum based on current research and best practice.

Our reading curriculum is designed to move children from a phonic and early words based programme towards comprehension and inference. This is underpinned through a 'Reading for Pleasure' environment and 'Reader' programme.

Equal Opportunity and Inclusion



Everyone is different, everyone is special and everyone matters.

John Scurr is an inclusive school, which means we are committed to helping children overcome any barriers to their learning they may have.

We want every child to achieve their full potential. In most cases the needs of all children can be addressed through planning and teaching and with the support of parents. However sometimes additional support may be required and our school takes pride in the quality of provision it is able to provide and the partnerships we have to promote inclusion.

Equal Opportunity and Inclusion



Our High Needs base in an assessment class, lead by an experienced class teacher who ensures that children with significant needs can be included meaningfully into a mainstream classroom.

John Scurr Primary is a multi-lingual school, and language is central to our identity. We believe that the home language of all our children should be recognised and valued. Children with english as an additional language make good progress with the support of the team, and we strive for all children to achieve national expectation in English.

We ask that all parents support us in this, and we Signpost parents to regular adult ESOL classes.

Child Protection (Safeguarding)



The Governors and staff fully recognise the contribution the school makes, in partnership with other local agencies, to safeguarding children.

We recognise that all staff, including volunteers, have a full and active part to play in protecting our pupils from harm and that everyone in the education service has a duty to keep children and young people safe. We are committed to safer recruitment practices.

All staff and governors believe that our school should provide a caring, positive safe and stimulating environment which promotes the social, physical and moral development of the individual child, emphasis on prevention and early intervention.

At John Scurr Primary we have staff Safeguarding, Health and Safety training updates.

School Visits, Travelling & Visitors



Educational visits are also an integral part of children's learning and we take full advantage of all the learning opportunities provided by our wonderful city and particularly our location in the heart of London's old east end.

These visits add scope and interest to subjects, and are vital to your child's understanding of the world. The school also regularly invites visitors to the school to enhance the curriculum, including theatre workshops and advisory staff. We also have a range of after school clubs throughout the week.

There is a standard school procedure for children taking part on school visits/journeys. You will receive notice before hand outlining the nature of the visit and cost if any. We ask that you value this part of the curriculum as much as we do. Parents are invited to train to be 'Education Visit Buddies', to accompany us on our school visits.

School Uniform



At John Scurr School children from Nursery to Y6 are expected to wear uniform. We encourage our children to come to school looking smart and ready for learning.

We believe wearing school uniform:

- Promotes a sense of community and belonging towards the school
- Is practical and smart
- Prevents children from coming to school in fashionable clothes that could detract them from their learning
- Is regarded as suitable wear for school and good value for money by most parents
- Is designed with health and safety in mind

We strongly suggest that each individual item of school uniform is clearly labelled with your child's name.

CONDITIONS OF USE

Morning Snack



The school is part of the National Fruit Scheme – A government initiative to promote healthy eating in young children. All children in Foundation and Key Stage 1 receive a portion of fruit daily free of charge.

All children have access to water throughout the day and we encourage children to bring a water bottle everyday from home.

Dinner money is paid to the office on a weekly basis. Further information regarding cost can be obtained from the school office. Nursery pupils at present are the only children required to pay for lunch.

We do ask ALL parents who receive Family Income Support to register for free school meals. By registering, the school will be able to access a larger amount of funding which will enhance your child's learning experience. Application forms can be found in this pack or collected from the school office. All applications are treated confidentially.

Healthy Lifestyle

At John Scurr Primary we promote a Healthy Lifestyle as a complimentary and vital part of the curriculum. We ask that as parents you also support this by:

- Encouraging all children to be toilet trained as soon as they start Nursery.
- Ensuring children have a PE kit.
- Walking or cycling to school.
- We have an onsite safe storage for bikes and scooters.
- Making sure children get enough sleep.
- Ensuring all pupils have a healthy breakfast before they come to school.
- NOT to bring any sweets, crisps, chocolates or fizzy drinks to school.

Lunch Arrangements



At John Scurr, we promote a positive approach to healthy living and eating. The school provides a selection of daily hot meals that always include a vegetarian or halal option and salad bar. Fresh meals cooked on site by our dedicated kitchen staff. If you wish to provide your child with a packed lunch from home, please ensure the meal provided is balanced and nutritious. Children will be closely supervised by our dedicated lunchtime supervisors.



Medical Matters



It is important that school is kept informed of all medical needs. Please let the school office or teacher know if your child requires regular access to medicines e.g asthma inhalers.

All necessary medicines must be provided by parents/ carers, clearly labelled and replenished promptly when required.

If your child has any particular allergies please let us know and provide any medicine necessary eg epipens; (we have several staff members trained to administer epipens).

Minor bumps and bruises are treated in school by our trained First Aiders, and we also have a school nurse who visits on a regular basis.

Illness at School



If a child becomes ill or injured during the school day, the parent/carer will be expected to make arrangements for their child to be collected as soon as possible.

The school must have up-to-date telephone numbers and other relevant information in case of an emergency.


Travelling to School
