The global Black Lives Matter protests give us the perfect opportunity to listen to our children and encourage debate and discussion about race and inequality within the home.

With this in mind, we have put together some resources which should give you more confidence to start a discussion and to help ease any anxieties your child may have.



George Floyd

On May 25th 2020, George Floyd, an African-American man, was killed in Minnesota USA while in police custody. This is one of many killings of African-Americans at the hands of the American police.

Mr Floyd's death has sparked protests across the US with demonstrators desperately calling for an end to police violence. He was an unarmed black man who died after a Minneapolis police officer kneeled on his neck for more than eight minutes as he told them "I can't breathe".

He moved to Minneapolis after being released from prison and was known as a "gentle giant" who was trying to turn his life around.

This injustice has outraged and broken the hearts of millions of people around the world, many of whom have taken to protesting to have their voices heard.

We do not shy away from broaching challenging topics about injustice and inequality. We understand that the death of George Floyd will have caused strong emotions within our community; we are outraged too.



Years 1 and 2










Here are some other great books that explore issues of race, equality, empathy and self-esteem.









